WORDS FROM WANG – “Reflections on the Season: Autumn”

The autumn equinox marks the arrival of the season of fall, traditionally seen as a period of changes leading us into the dark of winter. In the words of Christopher Hill "the dynamics of the fall of the year have the sweep of a great symphony or an epic poem" suggesting that this season of change provides us with some wonderful lessons in spirituality.

One fairly obvious spiritual lesson the autumn season offers is **letting go**. As we watch leaves fluttering to the ground in the fall, we are reminded that nature's cycles are mirrored in our lives thus autumn is a time for letting go and releasing things that have been a burden. Fall is also the right time to practice getting out of the way and letting the Spirit take charge of our lives.

Buddhist teacher Sharon Saltzberg, writes "Generosity has such power because it is characterized by the inner quality of letting go or relinquishing. Being able to let go, to give up, to renounce, to give generously; these capacities spring from the same source within us. When we practice generosity, we open to all of these liberating qualities simultaneously." Fall, then, is also the perfect season to give generously of your time and talents to others.

Autumn also reminds us of **the impermanence of everything**. Five short months ago we experienced the budding of life in spring leading us into the flowerings and profusions of summer. Now the leaves fall and bare branches remind us of the fleeting nature of all things. Rabbi Harold Kushner suggests that when we contemplate fall's changes, we grow more appreciative of all the beauties that surround us.

Fall also brings home the reality of death and the challenge to live every day to the fullest. There is a practice used by certain spiritual masters in Tibet who set their teacups upside down before they go to bed each night as a reminder that all life is impermanent. And then, when they awake each morning, they turn their teacups right side up again with the happy thought, "I'm still here!" This simple gesture is a wonderful reminder to celebrate every moment of the day.

This final thought reinforces my personal feelings about fall; it is the one season I wish would not end. I desire therefore to cherish every fleeting moment of its beauty and pleasing nature. It is in our letting go of all that restricts us and our ability to celebrate in the moment that nurtures us; body, mind, and spirit.

9/11 @ 15:What Have We Learned? –

October 11 @ 7:00pm. (Veterans Terrace)

The newly formed “Community Matters” team of Plymouth Church is planning it’s first community event; this year to acknowledge the 15th anniversary of the horrific day we will always remember as “9/11.” In light of all the tension in our society around the violence and negative rhetoric being experienced across the nation pastor Bob felt compelled to take the lead on this timely project and was therefore committed to enlisting the support and wisdom of the Muslim community and is pleased to have booked Mr. Ahmed Quereshi to come and address the greater Burlington community.

AHMED J. QUERESHI is the President of the Islamic Society of Milwaukee, the largest Islamic organization in Wisconsin, a position in which he has served since 2009. He has been a board member on the Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee’s Cabinet since 2003 and currently serves as Treasurer on its Executive Committee. In 2016, he was elected by U.S. and Canadian Islamic organizations belonging to the Islamic Society of North America, the largest Muslim organization in North America, to serve as a Community Representative on its Board of Directors.

Mr. Quereshi is an occasional instructor for the UWM School of Continuing Education where he teaches courses on Islam. He frequently speaks on Islam to non-Muslim audiences. He is an attorney practicing law with an office in Milwaukee and is a 1984 graduate of Marquette University Law School.

It is with great hope that the response to this event be significant in order that the Burlington community might show some support and solidarity with a people that have so often been misunderstood and mistreated that we might therefore take the opportunity to become more educated, concerned, and aware. As Christians, it is our responsibility to act on our beliefs that no person or group of persons receives anything less than the respect and love that they deserve. The event is free to the public although Veterans Terrace will be offering assorted beverages at their cash bar during the evening. Light munchies will also be served. There will be an opportunity to make a donation to help defray costs for the event. If you have any questions please contact Pastor Bob or the church office.

From our moderator:

How we "do" church is changing and the UCC has recognized that and created something called the **"Shift Initiative", or "Shift: from Maintenance to Mission"**. Very briefly, the Shift Initiative is a program that will challenge us to look at what's happening around us locally and nationally and define or re-define the role of Plymouth Church as we work in service to God in the Burlington community. Pastor Bob had a great article on this in his "Words from Wang" article in the June Epistle. I strongly encourage you to look that up and read it again.

The Operating Council will be discussing the Shift Initiative over the next several months. And at some point, we will ask all of you to participate in opportunities to meet and discuss the issues, ask any questions you might have, and eventually decide if and how we need to change in order to remain as faithful followers of God in our Christian faith.

Pastor Bob's upcoming community event to recognize the 15th Anniversary of the September 11, 2001 tragedy is a first step and a good example of Plymouth being more involved in our community and encouraging conversations about changes in the world.

So, here's how you can participate for now. I am sure this will generate some further questions and that's a good thing. I have some questions too. If you have any trouble accessing the website, contact me and I will help. SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE METHOD OF ACTION

The scholarship committee is currently made up of Paul B. Edwards CPA, Joe Iselin, Julie Klaehn and Jill Albrecht.

In the latter part of April a letter with an application form is sent to Burlington High School students that graduated in the last five years prior to the current year. This is to be returned by July 15. The church personnel advertise the church scholarships, and send a similar form to any church member requesting it. The High School students for the current year submit their applications to the guidance counselors, which are then delivered to five people to rate those students for Burlington High School Scholarships. Catholic Central guidance counselors receive their student's applications, and submit them for four Kiwanis members to rate the students for Kiwanis Scholarships.

All these rating schedules are accumulated for each group (Plymouth, BHS Scholarships and Kiwanis) The scholarships are rewarded by BHS Scholarships and Kiwanis committees. For Burlington High School a number of other scholarships are rewarded directly, and not through the BHS Scholarships Inc., committee. Catholic Central also has their own scholarship groups that award scholarships.

The committee members named in the first sentence review and rate the applications returned by the BHS prior graduates, and the ones returned by Plymouth Church members. That review produces a listing with the top rated to the lowest rated. When reviewing, the committee is looking for participation in activities such as sports, work and club memberships; review of writings by the students; and possible need. The scholarship part of the rating is the grade point times 10 and this is added to the other ratings per student based on a 1 to 10 rating on those items averaged for the four reviewers.

Some of the applications cannot be reviewed adequately because the questions are not answered and so in comparison to the students that answer all questions the students do not get as good a rating and therefore fall below others when maybe they should not have. This is unfortunate, but time and the use of volunteer help means nothing can be done at the reviewing stage. The students and possibly their parents need to be more attentive to this procedure. But parents, remember the scholarship is an award to the student and not to the parent. If the student does not give the grade point or supply it in some way then that has a big effect on the overall rating.

The committee meets and makes an ultimate decision for the scholarships to award within the scope as laid out by the Operating Council. They get as much information that is available for the current Burlington High School graduates and Catholic Central graduates and the scholarships already rewarded prior to selecting from the college graduates and the current high school graduates.

The scholarship amounts are then paid out and the accounts from which they are awarded are reduced. The current scholarship accounts are Carl and Isabel Backlin, Bernice Bonham, Jim Hoffman, Odette Miller, Ferne Salisbury, Ralph Wilson and Reverend Trent Rockwell. Some of these scholarships had prescribed qualifications. The committee attempts to adhere to those restrictions when the applicants fit the standards prescribed. Paul B. Edwards CPA is UCC Team Chairman, a Kiwanis Reviewer and scholarship record-keeper for their BHS Scholarship and the Catholic Central Scholarships, and a BHS Scholarship, Inc., reviewer.

Well our first Wednesday night was a success at LOGOS!! Thank you to all my volunteers that make this program awesome for our youth!! We saw some new faces to our program, and our repeat LOGOS kids. Sunday school is also underway, and I want to thank all my teachers and assistants for helping with the little ones in our congregation.

September is our starter month for our Children's Ministry programs, so not much to tell...but stay tuned for some amazing things happening in our church. We will be having a elephant ear and bake sale Sunday, October 9th after church. So bring some extra money to buy some yummy goodies and support our Children's Ministry program.
