# The Plymouth Epistle

**WORDS FROM WANG** – “Overwhelmed? Me Too!”

Breathe! Quiet your mind. Relax. Take another breath and blow it out. Now slowly say this breath prayer: *"My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth."* Say it again; *"My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth."* And one more time; *"My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth."* Did you remember to breathe? It's okay. It will come with a little practice. I love this simple little exercise that some practitioners say changed the way they live.

If you are like me, the recent news and political climate continue to create some real live tension and anxiety. It's beyond overwhelming; it has become altogether consuming to our minds, our hearts, our souls, and our strengths. But, before you throw your arms up in a defeatist tone - stop, and say the above breath prayer again.

Lent begins this month and with it comes the age old ritual of “giving up” something for Lent. But rather than “giving up” something for Lent this year consider taking on this useful spiritual “discipline;” namely the breath prayer. Here is a short description of the concept.

Breath prayer is an ancient Christian prayer practice dating back to at least the sixth century. Historically, it is associated with the Eastern Church, particularly Greek and Russian Orthodox churches. Known as the “Jesus Prayer” or “Prayer of the Heart,” early practitioners would repeat to the rhythm of their breath the phrase, “Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.” In time, the prayer was shortened to, “Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy” or simply, “Jesus, mercy.”

The breath prayer is usually said silently within. But some people sing it; others chant it. The reality is that it's your prayer; use it your way. Here's how it works:

1. Close your eyes and say or think the line *"My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth."* Then try to be still, calm, peaceful, and open to the presence of God.

2. With your eyes closed, imagine that God is calling you by name; that God is actually asking, *what do you need?*

3. Then give God a simple and direct answer that comes from the *what do you need?* question. Write down your answer. Whatever your answer, this is the foundation of your breath prayer.

4. Select the name that you are most comfortable using to speak with God. Combine it with your written answer to the question God asked you. This is your prayer. Breathe in the God name word; and then breathe out the second phrase/word which is your request or need. Repeat as many times as the spirit moves. Example: *"Compassionate God (inhale), help me to control my emotions (exhale)."*

Hold fast, therefore, to the hopeful word of God; and may the breath of God blow gently upon you this day, and for the weeks to come.

**March 26 @ 8:45** - Rehearsal with 10:00 worship to follow.


We always welcome new singers or players. Come help us make a joyful noise.

### **BOOK STUDY BEGINS**

Also as part of our Lenten offerings Pastor Bob will be leading a book study. The text we will be exploring together is not your typical Lenten theme or topic though the chosen book is as relevant and inspirational as any other book we might consider; not to mention it **will** give us all cause for spiritual reflection and introspective thinking.

The book is *Torn: Rescuing the Gospel from the Gays-vs-Christian Debate* by Justin Lee. It is a fact that the more we study together and seek understanding the better we will all be, and the more open minded we will become, as Christians regardless of our personal views on controversial matters. Open minds and open hearts are always the key to peacemaking and bridging all that divides us as human beings. Not to mention, that’s just one more way they’ll know we are compassionate Christians.

Our first session will be March 5 at 8:30 a.m. We will discuss chapters 1-3 so please come prepared having read those chapters. **ONA 2017** (New monthly feature) *“Taking the Bible Seriously...Not Literally”*

The United Church of Christ will be turning 60 this year. That is reason for celebration. And our heritage as a denomination with a social conscience has not changed and that is reason to celebrate as well.

One of the former presidents of our esteemed denomination once wrote: *“I offer this Pastoral Letter to remind all of us that the church is to be a place where all are welcomed, where the gifts of all are recognized and received, and where the rights of all defended and promoted. When so many in our society would reject and exclude, it is critical that we of the United Church of Christ bear witness to the conviction that it is possible to be deeply faithful to the Bible, profoundly respectful of the historic faith of the church and of its sacraments, and at the same time support the full inclusion and participation of all God’s children in the membership and ministry of the church.”*

By now we have already offered our first **Listening Session** where we discussed a few of the reasons why considering the Open and Affirming process and stance is worthy of our time and focus as a United Church of Christ congregation. We also began to engage in a careful and critical analysis of some of the Biblical texts traditionally used to condemn and hold hostage - people who identify with being homosexual.

This month’s feature is designed to be a review to that discussion or to benefit those who were unable to attend.

**“Even when we believe the scriptures are *without error*, it’s a risk to think our understanding is *without error*.”** (Rev. Dr. Mel White)

Many good people build their case against homosexuality almost entirely on the Bible. These folk value scripture and are serious about seeking its guidance in their lives. Unfortunately, many of them have never really studied, or given careful and prayerful attention to what the Bible does and doesn’t say about homosexuality. For example, many Christians don’t know that 1) Jesus says nothing about same-sex behavior 2) the Jewish prophets are silent about it 3) only 6 or 7 of the Bible’s one million verses refer to same-sex behavior in any way – however **none of these verses** truly refer to homosexual orientation as it’s perceived or understood today.

It is terribly dangerous to think that our understanding of every biblical text is without error...and we can misunderstand and misinterpret these ancient words with tragic results. One tragic present day example: Mark B. was a young man who accepted his sexual orientation “until he became a Christian” and was told on the basis of certain scriptures that he could not be both a Christian and a gay man. Mark committed suicide and wrote the following in his suicide note to God: “I just don’t know how else to fix this.”



An invitation is extended to all women interested in gathering with other women from our area and from around the world to collectively worship on this day. If you are interested in participating please see Carolyn Schoneck.




## One Great Hour of Sharing – March 26th

## From our Moderator...

ONA: an important issue for ALL at Plymouth to consider.

I hope everyone took the time to carefully read the letter sent by the Plymouth Church Open and Affirming Committee (ONA). Plymouth has scheduled several discussion sessions and a book study group to meet over the next few weeks and months. These meetings will give all of us a chance to talk about whether or not Plymouth Church should publically declare that we are an ONA church. That decision would have to be made at a congregational meeting sometime later this year. But before we decide which position to take, we have some work to do.



I know we have members who support different sides of this important but potentially divisive issue. We have members who fully support the ONA movement, and others who have a hard time verbalizing their equally strong belief that we should not declare Plymouth as being ONA. But I suspect most of us, myself included, are somewhere in-between.

This diversity of opinion is a good thing. It's part of our Congregational heritage. Everyone needs to be heard in this discussion. That will only happen if all of us attend as many of the sessions as we can. I understand those who think discussing ONA will be very difficult and uncomfortable and that's ok too. Jesus told his followers that living out their faith in the world would be difficult; that's still true today.

No matter where you stand on the ONA issue, your voice needs to be heard. And that can only happen if you attend the Sunday morning book study meetings and as many ONA discussion sessions as you can. We need to share, and listen and communicate to gain a better understanding of the whole ONA issue. That way we can make a very informed and intentional decision when it comes to a congregational vote.

I'm always happy to share my personal view so please contact me if you have questions. Otherwise get out to the sessions and participate. And pray that God will guide our thoughts, our words and our minds.
